

St. Jean Vianney, the Cure of Ars, once said, "The priesthood is the love of the heart of Jesus. When you see a priest, think of our Lord Jesus Christ." That quote exemplifies Father Randy Cuevas, who has been a humble, joyful, kind and caring servant of Christ for his 42 years of priestly service.

Father Randy will celebrate his retirement from active ministry on Sunday, June 30, at the 11 AM Mass at St. Aloysius Church, followed by a farewell luncheon reception immediately after Mass.

A native of Memphis, Tenn., with family roots in Slidell and on the Mississippi Gulf Coast, Father Randy grew up in Baton Rouge attending St. Aloysius Church and school. He graduated from

Fr. Michael Alello appointed as new St. Aloysius pastor

Father Michael Alello has been named the new pastor of St. Aloysius Church, replacing Father Randy Cuevas, who retires from active ministry on June 30. Alello, a native of Baton Rouge, attended elementary school at St. Jude the Apostle and is a 1998 graduate of Catholic High School.

After CHS, he enrolled at LSU, where he obtained a bachelor of arts degree in philosophy with a concentration in religious studies and a minor in business. Father Michael then went on to earn a master of divinity from Notre Dame Seminary in New Orleans.

He was ordained a priest for the Diocese of Baton Rouge in 2007, serving as parochial

vicar in East St. James Parish and at St. John the Evangelist in Prairieville before his first pastorate, at St. Philomena in Labadieville. He served there for seven years before heading back to Baton Rouge to be the pastor of

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Church staff retirements usher in a time of change

Three members of our church staff — Tricia Greely, Angela Falgoust, and Sou Sanders will be retiring soon, while another member, Mark Christian, has left for a new opportunity out of state.

Tricia Greely is retiring July 1 after 24 years of service at St. Aloysius as the Director of Children Formation.

Earlier in her career, Tricia worked as a banker in Baton Rouge. As her family grew, Tricia changed careers and began working at the St. Jean Vianney School in 1992, where she served as the religion coordinator.

One day in 2000. Tricia received a phone call from former St. Aloysius pastor, Father Gerald Burns, inviting her to interview for a position at St. Aloysius as the Director of Children Formation. Tricia recalled that she was "very honored" to receive the call from Father Burns and, since saying "yes" to that call nearly 24 years ago, she has been warmly welcomed into the parish by the St. Alovsius community.

During a recent interview, Tricia recalled how blessed she has been over the past 24 years at St. Aloysius to have worked closely with multiple pastors (Father Burns, Father Than Vu and Father Randy Cuevas), colleagues and the wonderful volunteers of the parish who played such an important role in helping Tricia execute the numerous successful ministries she oversaw.

Tricia also shared that the parts of her role as Children Formation Director that she enjoyed the most have been "her interaction with the parishioners."

Tricia said one of her biggest ioys is meeting each family where they are in life and helping them in their unique journeys of faith through the Catholic Church "so they feel the presence of Jesus in their life."

Just this year, Tricia ministered to roughly 135 children and their families by helping the children and students of St. Alovsius prepare for First Reconciliation and First Holy Communion. Tricia also directs and oversees baptismal preparation for infants up to sixth graders, and ministry programs such as Vacation Bible School, Music Makers, and Children's Church.

One ministry that Tricia is especially proud of is the Parish School of Religion (PSR), for first through sixth grades. PSR is a Catholic Formation program for children in the parish who do not attend daily Catholic religion classes at their schools. Through this program, children attend religion classes on Sunday mornings on campus and work with catechists, who guide and instruct the PSR students in their religious formation.

During retirement, Tricia said she is looking forward to spending more time at home with her husband and family. Tricia and her husband, John, have two sons and two grandchildren.

Mark Christian

After six years as the Adult Formation Director, Mark Christian has left his position for a new opportunity in Alabama. Mark is looking forward to living closer to his daughter, Sarah, her husband, and his grandchildren, as well as starting his new role as Adult Education Director at Prince of Peace Catholic Church located in Hoover, Ala.

Mark saw the opportunity on the Prince of Peace parish website one day after looking up Catholic churches in the area while helping his daughter look for a house to buy. His wife encouraged him to apply.

During a recent interview, when asked how he is anticipating this new opportunity, Mark said he is "excited and hoping to find the same faithfulness and enthusiasm I experienced at St. Aloysius."

Mark described his time at St. Aloysius as "joyful, hospitable and sometimes challenging because of interest in developing new things." While reflecting on his time at St. Aloysius, Mark said it was a wonderful place to be, adding, "I'm hoping to find a home like Alovsius where I'm going."

Angela Falgoust, Director of Pastoral Services, and Sou Sanders, Executive Assistant to Father Randy, will also be retiring. Angela retires June 14 after serving in her role since May 2006, and Sou on July 1 after being here since August 2019.

While they won't be on the parish staff anymore, they'll still be around campus attending Mass and other functions!

We wish and pray the very best for Tricia, Angela, Sou, and Mark as they start new chapters! Together, the four of them have given 53 years of total service to St. Aloysius!

St. Joseph Cathedral Prep High School in 1974; University of St. Thomas in Houston with a B.A. in Political Science in 1978; Pontifical University of St. Thomas Aguinas in Rome, Italy, with an S.T.B. degree in Theology in 1981; and from Pontifical Athenaeum Sant' Anselmo in Rome, Italy, with an S.T.L. degree in Dogmatic-Sacramental Theology in 1983.

He was ordained a transitional deacon in April 1982 in Rome by William Cardinal Baum, and was ordained a priest on June 26, 1982, at St. Joseph Cathedral. Since his priesthood ordination, he's radiated the love of Jesus to several flocks: Ascension of Our Lord in Donaldsonville, St. Jean Vianney in Baton Rouge, St. Mary of False River in New Roads, St. Margaret in Albany, St. Albert the Great Chapel and Catholic Student Center in Hammond, and here at St. Alovsius.

He has served as Catholic school chaplain at Ascension Catholic Schools in Donaldsonville — serving as Superintendent of the Ascension Catholic Internarochial School System from 1992 to 2004 — as well as Catholic of Pointe Coupee in New Roads and St. Thomas Aquinas High School in Hammond.

Let's also not forget his 30 years in the U.S. Air Force Reserves as a chaplain! He retired from the U. S. Air Force Reserve Chaplaincy in 2009 with the rank of colonel. He is a decorated veteran and was embedded in combat zones for two deployments with the U.S. Army and Marines in Afghanistan between 2004 and 2006.

He has been actively involved in the National Catholic Committee on Scouting and the Knights of Columbus for the past 40 years. A former National Chaplain of the National Catholic Committee on Scouting (NCCS), he is currently the NCCS annual national convention planner and committee member of Troop 7 chartered at St. Aloysius.

He was selected as distinguished Diocesan School Pastor of the Year for 2021-2022, and within the same year was awarded the distinction of the National Catholic Education Association's "Lead, Learn, and Proclaim Award,' which only two pastors in the United States received that year.

Even though he'll be retiring from active parish administration, he won't be retiring from the priesthood itself! As it is says in the Bible, "You are a priest forever in the line of Melchizedek," Hebrews 7:17.

In his last pastor article, which will appear in the June 30 bulletin, Father Randy leaves a note that is fitting to share here: "As I transition to retirement, thank you for your generous and plentiful expressions of appreciation for my 42 years of priestly service, and especially of my last nine years with you. Thank you for your continued prayers that I enjoy a healthy, active and happy retirement!"



K.C. essay contest winners announced

The goal of this yearly program is to promote and strengthen the patriotic spirit in our youth. The competition provides students with an opportunity to think and learn about our country's rich heritage. This year's theme was, "The First Amendment guarantees our right to free speech, but should there be any limits to free speech on social media?"

Students were invited to write a 500- to 750-word essay on the theme and upload their work to a website for grading. Students' names and schools were kept confidential.

130 students from St. Jude the Apostle, St. George and St. Aloysius Catholic Schools submitted

- and flagpole improvements and beautification at Red Stick Academy (Wilks Pitt-






St. Aloysius team assembles traditional St. Joseph's Altar

By Teresa Day On March 18-19, St. Aloysius parishioners and school parents honored St. Joseph, the head of the Holy Family, with a traditional St. Joseph's Altar. It was the first St. Joseph's Altar at St. Aloysius since 2012. A dedicated committee assembled this elaborate altar in our parish, bringing to life Sicilian traditions of honor to St. Joseph.

Back in the Middle Ages, a widespread drought and resulting famine devastated the Italian island of Sicily. The people of Sicily pleaded with their patron saint, St. Joseph, to intercede for them in this time of suffering. Their prayers were answered with their discovery of the fava bean, which sustained them in the dry conditions until rain returned and the island was restored.

In gratitude, Sicilians arranged a table with food they harvested, prepared and shared. In the early 1900s, immigrating Sicilian families brought the custom of honoring St. Joseph for his continued intercessions for nourishment to South Louisiana.

"So many people have a deep devotion to St. Joseph and embraced this time-honored tradition, even without a connection to the Sicilian history of St. Joseph's Altars," said Amy Cannizaro Burris, co-chair of the St. Joseph's Altar Committee.

Amy and fellow parishioner and school parent Molly Nelson led a 20-person committee to gather the items necessary to create a St. Joseph's Altar. The committee assembled the altar at the back of the church where it could be shared with all who wanted to view it.

The altar's celebration began Monday, March 18, in the evening with St. Aloysius children performing the traditional Tupa-Tupa (knock-knock) skit about the Holy Family knocking door-todoor in search of food and shelter. The St. Aloysius Men's Club provided a spaghetti dinner following the skit in the Parish Hall. The altar remained until after Mass on Tuesday, March 19, the Solemnity of St. Joseph.

"So many people shared how touched they were by the altar. said Molly. "It was very moving."

The St. Joseph's Altar Committee worked for months securing the appropriate foods and rounding up volunteers to conduct the activities that traditionally honor St. Joseph. Volunteers came from across the church parish and beyond to bring baked goods, flowers and more. Even celebrity chef John Folse prepared the traditional whole fish, an important part of the display that represents Jesus' miracle of multiplying of the loaves and fishes.

In addition to the whole fish, other important altar items included wine to represent Jesus'



first miracle at the wedding of Cana and cakes in the shape of the Pascal Lamb, crosses and the Holy Bible. Edible symbols are always present in a St. Joseph's Altar. Baked breads in the shapes of hammers and other carpentry tools are present, along with breadcrumbs to symbolize the sawdust of a carpenter's work. Of course, the altar held traditional Italian cookies. Those wishing to find a spouse or grow a family found lemons that represented one of Italy's most significant

"We were blown away by everyone sharing their talents by donating special baked items for the altar," Molly said about the intricate items made and shared.

If you are wondering what happens to the altar's bounty, you'll be glad to know the committee shared it with many in need. The committee took great care to ensure there was little waste. The committee shared the food with charities in our parish area, including St. Vincent de Paul and Metanoia Manor. A donation box raised funds for the St. Aloysius St. Vincent de Paul Conference to disperse to people in need of emergency assistance with bills. Even the flowers were shared with the St. Alovsius School teachers to brighten their classrooms.

Along with the bounty of food, St. Aloysius parishioners and students shared memorial photos of loved ones to display on the altar in places of honor. Parishioners also shared treasured St. Joseph statues and holy family paintings from their homes to add to the altar. These additions made the altar a unique representation of our own parish community.

St. Aloysius School students got involved in celebrating St. Joseph and the altar preparations. Students helped the committee pack blessing bags for everyone who came to view the altar. The bags included sample cookies, special prayers to St. Joseph and, if you were lucky, a fava bean. Keepsake cards included a history of the St. Joseph Altar and explained the traditional symbols.

Everyone had special gifts and seeing their gifts come together had a whole divine touch to it," said Amy. "There were so many 'God winks' as our committee called them.'

One "God wink" came from a

parishioner who saw the call for volunteers in the bulletin and reached out to offer to bake Pascal lamb cakes — not knowing anything about St. Joseph Altars or that it was a traditional item.

A collective 1,600 parishioners, students, family and friends watched the skit, enjoyed the spaghetti dinner and viewed the St. Joseph's Altar during the days it was displayed.

"Having the altar in the church made it extra special and unique. It just added a beautiful, emotional element to the altar and helped us keep it very reverent," said Amy. "That is something special about our altar that you don't typically find anywhere else."
